The college was established in 1924 as the first women college of University of Delhi. The grandeur college main building reminds of the British architect of the colonial times. Those were the times when women were not sent to schools and colleges. But this institution had seen women actively working in all spheres of life whether socially, culturally or professionally. With changing times the College has grown as an institution devoted to excellence in teaching and learning. The sprawling green campus, accomplished faculty, research orientation, Internship programs, and the cutting-edge educational facilities at Indraprastha College helps its students to grow up as confident and independent young women, taking up diverse roles and developing as socially conscientious citizens.

With changing global scenarios after the COVID times, the college is collaborating with international organisations for various environmental and sustainable development programs. The research centres provide excellent facilities to the students to learn more about international issues and their governance. The mission is to steer the education it offers not only to lead to the pragmatic goal of employability, but also to construct a life of the conscious mind and orient its students to the service of the community, in the quest for a better society and the world that we inhabit. The college firmly believes on the sustainability by transforming the innovative ideas into the reality based on the concept of "Vaisudev Kutubakam", i.e. the entire earth as one family.

The college has vast green tracts with many trees as old as more than hundreds of years. The different species of flora, birds and butterflies makes this place heaven for nature lovers. The college campus is free of plastic pollution with Zero SUP Zone. The College hosts hundreds of young aspiring women in two of its Student Residences: the Kalavati Gupta Student Residences and the Indraprastha College Women's Residences with the option of air-conditioned rooms. Our aim is to give homely and family comforts to our students. The college committees work round the clock to take care of the students living in these residents.

Indraprastha College for Women is the only College of the University of Delhi and the Country, to offer B.A. (Hons.) Multi Media and Mass Communication. The Course is self- financed and approved by the University of Delhi. The College has the infrastructure including a fully equipped studio, a radio production centre, editing bays, Multi Media Lab, updated software and applications, and the equipment required for in-house training and production related to the Course. The Alumina of the department were the pioneers in the field of media and journalism in the country.

- Admission to all courses for the academic session 2023-2024 will be through Common Seat Allocation System (CSAS)-2023 based on the scores obtained in CUET 2023, except for Foreign Nationals.
- The name of the Candidate claiming reservation must match with the Candidate's name as it appears on their corresponding School Board qualifying certificates and in the CUET(UG) 2023/ CUET(PG)-2023. Similarly, the parents' names must also match in the certificates.
- No undertaking on behalf of incomplete/invalid/non-availability of the document/certificate at the time of admission will be accepted.
- Candidates should refer to the UG/PG Bulletin of Information 2023-24 and keep checking the admission website (admission.uod.ac.in) for all updates, schedules and information.
- The College will follow the admission schedule announced by the University of Delhi. Kindly check the University website (admission.uod.ac.in) for updates.

# **ABOUT INDRAPRASTHA COLLEGE FOR WOMEN**

Indraprastha College for Women (estd. 1924) is a constituent college of the University of Delhi and its oldest women's college. Founded as a part of a nation-wide campaign for women's education and empowerment, it is located on a beautiful campus which is a recognized heritage site and a landmark of Delhi. It has an enrolment of approximately 3500 students in its UG and PG programs. The College offers a wide range of courses, which promotes interdisciplinary studies in the 3 streams of Humanities, Mathematical Sciences and Commerce. Uniquely, the College offers the self financed B.A. (Hons.) in Multi Media and Mass Communication. It was accredited with Grade 'A+'.

The College Student Services include a vigorous Diversity Integration Program. It follows a Need Blind Admission Policy. The College is 100% barrier free and has a "Under One Roof" Enabling Unit (EU) and Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC). Apart from a proactive financial aid policy, it organizes courses in ICT skills for Economically Weaker Sections (EWS), and skill training courses for Persons with Benchmark Disability (PwBD). For advanced learners, the College has a Research Methodology Program, and has instituted an Under-graduate Research Grant for innovative and original projects. It has an International Student Desk, North East Society and an active Women's Development Cell with a Gender Sensitization Committee. It offers basic medical facilities with regular attendance of a Nurse and a Counsellor, with access to the neighbourhood hospital for medical emergencies. The College has a mentorship program and a Career Guidance and Placement Cell.

The College has created nine Research and Learning Resource Centres. The Museum and Archives Learning Resource Centre houses heritage and contemporary exhibits of the College. The Translation and Translation Studies Centre for independent research and skill development in languages. The Centre for Earth Studies promotes research in ecology and environment, and the Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies brings all the disciplines of the College together. It has added the Centre for Sanskrit Studies and Research and the Music Archives & Listening Room (Baithak) in 2017. The Yoga and Well-Being Centre was added in 2019 and the Centre for Culture Studies and the Centre for Disability Studies in 2023.

The College has two Student Residences to accommodate 450 students, the 170 seater Indraprastha College Women's Student Residences and the Kalavati Gupta Student Residences (KG) which has total number of 280 seats. The IP Student Residences also has the option of A.C rooms.

The well-stocked Library has a book bank, an elevator for disability access and houses the ICT centre with 45 computers. The College has its own studio and production centre, a multimedia lab and editing bays, a hub for Community Radio with world-wide broadcast facilities through DUCR, an Audio-Visual Resource Centre, Seminar Rooms, State-of-the-Art Conference Room, a fully air-conditioned Auditorium with 586 seating capacity, four Exhibition Foyers, well-equipped laboratories and other infrastructure to support its academic and co-curricular activities.

It has vast playgrounds and Multi-facility Sports Infrastructure with a Swimming Pool, Climbing Wall, Walking Track, Gymnasium, Shooting Range, Fitness Centre and a sprawling sports complex. A wide range of extra-curricular activities are encouraged. The College has its own 26 seater bus. To support its formidable infrastructure and facilities, the College has full power back-up to ensure that all activities are carried out without interruption.

Environment consciousness is a core agenda of the College and its heritage campus serves as a laboratory for both observation and practice. The College has a dense green cover and its biodiversity is phenomenal. Students activities are organized around tree census, bird census, butterfly count and a vigorous Waste Management Program. The College uses leaves to make compost, food waste to make manure and recycles paper waste. Electronic and plastic waste is disposed for recycling in collaboration with expert bodies. There are nine rainwater harvesting pits and solar powered lighting on campus.

The College encourages an Animal-friendly campus. There are dogs, cats, peacocks, kites, varieties of migratory birds and rescued birds and animals on campus. They are looked after by the College community.

The College has an active Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and submits its Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR), regularly to the accreditation body.



Indraprastha College for Women admits students to all the three streams: Arts and Social Sciences, Commerce and Mathematical Sciences which are taught in the semester mode.

#### **Department of Environmental Studies**

The Department of Environmental Studies is one of the youngest departments of Indraprastha College for Women and was established in the year 2014. The Department was set up in response to the University of Delhi's direction for all colleges to initiate a one semester Compulsory Course on Environmental Studies. With the introduction of the New Education Policy (NEP) in the University of Delhi in the academic year 2022-23, Environmental Science is now a 4 Credit Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) spread over two semesters.

The Department of Environmental Studies coordinates and teaches the AEC Course on Environmental Science to all students who are enrolled in all the other Departments of the College. The department also offers a wide cohort of GE (Generic Elective) and SEC (Skill Enhancement) courses for the students under the new NEP framework.

Environmental Studies is a highly specialized interdisciplinary subject and imparting environmental education therefore requires academicians who are trained in the subject. Members of the faculty include Dr. Nawin Kumar Tiwary and highly qualified guest faculty members who have expertise in their respective areas of work.

The Department of Environmental Studies is well connected with eminent academicians, scholars and researchers from various disciplines who are contributing to the multidisciplinary field of Environmental Studies. The Department adopts classroom, field and project-based approach for teaching and for ensuring that students develop an overall understanding of the subject. Students are also offered internship opportunities with various environmental organizations which are facilitated by the Department. The Department also organizes various environment-related workshops, Lectures, Conferences, Seminars and youth summits.



# History & Heritage

The Indraprastha College for Women was founded in 1924 and is the oldest women's college of the University of Delhi. It began with three students, in a room on the second floor of an old, now heritage, mansion housing the Indraprastha Girls' Senior Secondary School, in Chippiwara in the Jama Masjid area of Chandni Chowk, in the walled city of Old Delhi. Degree courses were introduced in 1930s, and the University recognized Indraprastha College as a degree college in 1938. After some years, the College moved to Chandrawali Bhawan in the Civil Lines, and was moved again to 'Alipore House' at Alipur Road (now Sham Nath Marg) to the office-cumresidence of the British Commander-in-Chief in 1938, where it exists till today.

The parent school and the College both grew out of the efforts of a group of philanthropists associated with the Theosophical Society of India. They were inspired by Mrs. Annie Besant, also a theosophist, who believed in and promoted education for women in North India, at a time when women were confined to home and realized their destiny in marriage and motherhood. The vision of the College intensified over the decades, and remains focused on the holistic development and empowerment of women.

The College has intersected the National Movement, the Education Reforms Movement, and the Women's Movement, and is itself a movement today. It has a glorious tradition of academics and service which has only grown over the years. Housed in a beautiful building, on a green campus spread over 14.5 acres, the College building was accorded heritage status in 2002. The College is a milestone in the heritage walk of colonial Delhi. As the College marches towards its centenary, it has added to its academic and infrastructural resources, always mindful of its core vision to empower and mainstream the marginalized.

The College is in the 99<sup>th</sup> year of a glorious journey. We have already initiated various activities and have plans spread over the coming year towards its 100-year celebrations. This includes major developments in infrastructure and academic expansion, ranging from new blocks to new courses. In pursuit of academic excellence beyond the classroom. The Centenary Decade Undergraduate Research Grant is given by the College every year to promote research in various fields that have theoretical, conceptual, methodological and policy implications. A decade long Round Table Conference on Gandhi was initiated in 2014 that will culminate in an international symposium in the centennial year.

#### Vision


The Vision of the College is to educate, enable and empower young women, emphasizing the need to mainstream the marginalized and weaker sections among them to ensure justice and equity in society.

#### **Department of History**

The Department of History is one of the oldest faculties at the Indraprastha College for Women established in 1924. Here we offer a vibrant environment to cultivate skills to do historians' craft and develop employability. Our pedagogy stretches beyond regular lectures and tutorials to include aspects of experiential learning using classroom video projections, excursions to historical sites, and visits to museums and exhibitions. We also have dedicated programmes for engaging with heritage through collaborative projects and workshops with the INTACH, National Archives of India, and Archaeological Survey of India. Further, an Indo-German Students Workshop on *Sufismin South Asia: A View from Delhi* was organised in January 2020. This will be followed by a second Indo-German Workshop in September 2023.

These aspects of experiential learning are coordinated by the History Societys. It organizes special lectures and conferences by eminent historians and conducts student paper presentations on dedicated themes to promote



research methods and writing skills. Such research initiatives find a platform for online publication in the Department Journal *Nazariyat* and Students Magazine *Reminiscence*.

Our faculty is committed to research and publishing; involved in curriculum development for universities; and skilled at innovative teaching. Members of the faculty include Dr. Pragati Mohapatra, Dr. Asha Shukla Choubey, Dr. Meenakshi Khanna and Dr. Ruchika Singh (Teacher-in-charge).

Over the years we have created an illustrious alumni network with careers in civil services, judiciary, journalism, mass communication, teaching, research, archaeology, and museum studies. #### **Department of Mathematics**

Mathematics has been a part of Indraprastha College for Women since 1933. Initially, from 1933 to 1948, the teaching of Mathematics was only at the Undergraduate Course at Pass Course Level and Mr. G. Goswami was the only teaching faculty member in that period. Later, in 1948, late Dr. Nirmala Prakash, Professor of Mathematics joined the college as faculty member and because of her deep interest in mathematics she worked hard to start the Mathematics Course at Honours and Post graduate level. Ultimately the college introduced B.A. (Hons.) Mathematics in 1954 and M.A. Mathematics in 1958.

The Strength of the Department lies in its highly qualified, experienced and committed faculty and their personal interaction with students. The department aspires that its students get the most out of the time studying at college through class room teaching combined with co-curricular experiences. Along with regular classes, a lot of emphasis is given to 'hands-on' exposure to modern software's such as Mathematica, Octave, MATLAB, LaTeX and Statistical software- R to support visualization and better understanding of the concepts through practical and tutorial classes.

The Course helps to create deep interest in learning mathematics; to develop broad and balanced knowledge and understanding of definitions, concepts, principles, and theorems; and to use appropriate mathematical concepts



and skills to solve problems in both familiar and unfamiliar situations including those in real-life contexts.

Students graduating from the department have had a world of career options. Every year, a reasonable number of students go for masters in pure and applied mathematics at IITs, IISc and various renowned universities to prepare themselves for research and teaching. Students of the Department have been placed at prominent companies like Wipro, D.E. Shaw India Pvt. Ltd., Marquee Equity, TopHire, Chegg India Pvt. Ltd., SAP, Galytix Analytics Ltd. Others have excelled in fields including actuarial sciences, management, operational research and civil services.

# **RESEARCH AND LEARNING CENTRES**

## 1. Centre for Culture Studies

Culture as a concept and practice attracts academic attention from a wide variety of disciplines. As a field of research, it opens up avenues for academicians, artists, administrators and archival researchers alike. In the Indian University system, disciplines as diverse as Anthropology, Language and Literary Studies compete to define culture as an arena of research and teaching. Centre for Culture Studies is intended to disseminate, deliberate and discuss the epistemological and ontological knowledge and to enlarge the comprehension of culture.

## 2. Centre for Disability Studies

Indraprastha College for Women has established Centre for Disability Studies intending to increase disability awareness among the non-disabled, to train manpower in disability services, and to promote the rights and entitlements of persons with disabilities. The Centre was formally launched on the World Braille Day i.e., 4 January 2023. The proposed centre will be an academic unit fostering teaching and research on disability. The vision is to bring synergy between policy framework and academic research.

## 3. Centre for Earth Studies

The Centre for Earth Studies (CES) was launched in 2016 with a vision to promote research and learning in areas around sustainable development. It aims to develop life skills, environmental awareness and ecological consciousness among the community that will be ready to face the challenges of climate change, environmental degradation and ecological conservation. In this journey towards a common sustainable future, the Centre takes up several research projects for students to work under expert faculty mentorship.

## 4. Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies

Established in 2016, the Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies, encourages students to undertake research and projects which enable them to work through and appreciate the interrelatedness of academic disciplines. The Centre provides a forum for young scholars to present their work-in progress and stimulate the minds of students and engage them in a dialogue with their peers. Seminars, conferences and talks by scholars are organized on a continuous basis.

## 5. Centre for Yoga and Well-Being

Indraprastha College for Women's, focuses on the well-being of a community which includes mental health and spiritual development. Students who indulge in academics and sports need to rejuvenate which can also be done through the practice of Yoga and meditation. The Centre for Yoga and Well-Being sensitises people about the importance of physical and mental well-being through Yoga.

## 6. Music Archives and Listening Room (MALR)

The Music Archives and Listening Room is a unique project initiated in 2017, which encourages the solitary pursuit of "listening" to music and discovering its making in all its nuances. The Archive is a collection developed through donations from music lovers and practitioners of Indian Classical Music, in its various







manifestations and embodiments. The activities of the Archive are organized by the students' society called *Baithak*. The activities of MALR range from organizing performances and lecture demonstrations by renowned artists to conducting informal listening sessions, movie screenings on the lives of stalwarts of Hindustani Music and cataloguing of the rare recordings are done by students under the supervision of faculty advisors.



## 7. Sanskrit Studies and Research Centre

The Sanskrit Studies and Research Centre is envisioned to promote the study of the Sanskrit language as an invaluable heritage which is a key to unlock the vast

corpus of knowledge it treasures. It is an off-shoot of the Translation and Translations Studies Centre and rests upon the College's collection of rare books in Sanskrit. The Centre aims to promote the acquisition of language skills along with the phonetics and phonology of Sanskrit.

#### 8. Translation and Translation Studies Centre

The Translation and Translation Studies Centre was set up in 2015 to stimulate student interest and engagement with both language and cultural diversity, particularly in India. The Centre organises talks, workshops, and lectures by erudite scholars, writers, and translators throughout the year. It also publishes an annual student Journal of Translation, CODE.




# Academic Societies of the Departments

JOB OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED ACROSS DEPARTMENTS



The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of Indraprastha College for Women is best described by its name, J.E.E.T., which stands for Jobs | Entrepreneurship | Excellence | Talent. J.E.E.T. works towards facilitating fellow students to make informed decisions about their career choices by organizing various skill enhancement and interactive sessions on career guidance throughout the year. It also invites various corporate enterprises to its campus and organizes placement drives, bringing a range of job opportunities for the graduating students.

J.E.E.T. also facilitates internship opportunities for students – In-office Internships (during the winter and summer break) as well as Parttime/Work from Home Internships (during the session) – which enable them to gain work experience and explore the corporate culture.

A total number of job offers received this session stands at 181. The maximum job offers have been received by the students from the Commerce department, followed by Computer Science and Mathematics.

The average CTC for the year is Rs. 6.87 lakhs per annum. The highest package of 21 lakhs per annum has been offered by The D.E. Shaw Group to Ms. Anjali Bhardwaj and Ms. Raghavi Nagpaul, both of B.A.(H) Economics.

# **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

## Attendance Requirement and Rules for all enrolled Students

The College firmly believes in the classroom interaction and experience and insists that regularity in class is necessary for students to derive value from a semester program.

- 1. Regularity in the class/ class presentations/tutorials/practicals is compulsory every semester, and forms a part of the evaluation for Internal Assessment.
- 2. Attendance of students is compulsory in all activities of the Departments including Seminars/ Conferences/Talks etc. that are organized during the year.
- 3. It is essential for students to have a minimum attendance of 2/3<sup>rd</sup> of the total number of classes separately in Lectures and Practicals in every semester.
- 4. Submission of projects and meeting deadlines for assignments etc. is compulsory. Students not submitting in time will be penalized in the evaluation.
- 5. Students with less than 2/3<sup>rd</sup> attendance and absence in the Student Presentation session of Departmental Academic Society, will not be facilitated by the College for Student Residence admission, financial assistance, official positions, prizes, recommendations, internships etc.
- 6. A student who does not fulfill the minimum attendance requirement per semester, will be considered to have wasted the precious resources of the College and will forfeit all refundable deposits made to the College and will pay under that head in the successive semester at the time of payment of fees.
- 7. The College reserves the right to debar students falling short of the required attendance, from taking class tests related to Internal Assessment and non-acceptance of assessments related to the same.
- 8. Students who do not pay their fees to enrol in the Semester by the due date, will not be permitted to fill the Examination Form and will be deemed to be not on the roles of the College.
- 9. An ex-student can take the examination only if she has requisite attendance, as per University rules. The Internal Assessment marks will remain unchanged.

# Note: Students are directed to check the College website regularly for information and updates.

## Attendance Waivers for Representing College/University/Country

Students officially representing the College in any activity are required to seek prior sanction and submit related documents duly verified by Advisors/Competent Authorities within three days of their return, to avail waiver on attendance.

## **Submission of Medical Certificates**

Medical certificates should be submitted within 3 days of joining back with a covering application addressed to the Principal along with supporting documents (lab reports, X-ray etc) at the college dispatch window. A copy of the medical documents submitted to the office has to be given to the teacher-in-charge for record. No medical certificate will be accepted later.

## **Submission of Examination Forms**

Students are required to submit their examination forms in time as per the announced schedule. Students who fail to pay their College fees for the academic session by the due date will not be permitted to fill the examination form.

# **COLLEGE DISCIPLINE-ORDINANCE XV-B**

Maintenance of discipline among Students of the University

- 1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice-Chancellor.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he/she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf. (21)
- 3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
  - a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non teaching staff of any Institution/Department and against any student within the University of Delhi
  - b. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons
  - c. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976
  - d. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes
  - e. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women
  - f. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner
  - g. Willful destruction of institutional property
  - h. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds
  - i. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
  - j. Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
- 4. Without prejudice to the generality of his/her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students
  - a. be expelled; or
  - b. be, for a stated period rusticated; or
  - c. be not for a stated period, admitted to a course or courses of study in a College, Department or Institution of the University; or
  - d. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
  - e. be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or
  - f. that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.
- 5. The Principals of the Colleges, Heads of the Halls, Deans of Faculties, Heads of Teaching Departments in the University, the Principal, School of Open Learning and Librarians shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in their respective Colleges, Institutions, Faculties and Teaching Departments in the University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
- 6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected provide himself/herself with a copy of these rules.
- 7. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he/she submits himself/herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University.

## PROHIBITION AND PUNISHMENT FOR RAGGING-ORDINANCE XV-C

- 1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of the College/Department or Institution and any part of the Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
- 2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
- 3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students, and includes individual or collective acts or practices which–
  - a. involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
  - b. violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
  - c. violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes.
  - d. expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self esteem.
  - e. entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
- 4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, University Student Residences or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
- 5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suomoto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
- 6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
- 7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
- 8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
- 9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under Clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3 (a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
- 10. The Vice-Chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or student be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a course of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
- 11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of the University of Delhi are found guilty, under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma conferred by the University.
- 12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
