This sector stands as a poignant symbol of our nation's cultural opulence and is a vital source of livelihood for many individuals. After the screening a question-and-answer round was mediated by Rukasar Khilchi which witnessed an insightful discussion on various issues concerning the handloom industry including those like low earnings of the weavers, impact of climate change, competition from power loom and the role that digital platforms can play with valuable inputs from Mr. Raghavendra Ganji. Dr Praveen Dhanda, convener of Gandhi Study Circle, also gave his inputs on the importance of Handloom during the discussion.

The students gained immense knowledge and understanding about both the functioning of the handloom sector and the challenges that it faces through the screening and a stimulating discussion. Many also attempted to come up with innovative solutions for the problems. Some among these solutions included the idea of creating a brand name and reputation for the handloom weavers and organising teaching workshops which could address the problem of financial instability in the sector.
