



### International Day of Yoga: Webinar on Yoga & Holistic Learning








### International plastic bag free day -Plantation Drive


### Mental Health during Pandemic - Group Discussion






### Educational Celebration of Independence Day






### Singing of the National Anthem






### Poster Making Competition under Azadi ka Amrut Mahotsav






### Poster Making Competition (Tobacco Free Educational Institutions)






### Voter ID Campaign under Youth Voter Festival

### Report on Gandhi Jayanti Presentations




reliance, swadeshi movement, self discipline, equality, brotherhood, his views against untouchability and discrimination, non-violent peaceful movements and Satyagraha.



The competition helped volunteers to know more about the growth trajectory of India and getting familiar with the primary sector.

#### India's Growth in the Primary Sector in Past 75 Years

What according to you is farming life about?

It's preserving land and the art of growing food for the future generations, while in the present giving the farmers a job to do that's part of a mission bigger than themselves. The farm shapes characters and teaches lessons for life. Those farms are the farmer's whole life. One of the most principal sectors of the 'Indian economy' remains the primary sector which mainly comprises Agriculture.

The Agriculture Sector possesses the focal point of the audience in the Indian economy epitomizing three push regions:

(1) to advance comprehensive development, (2) to upgrade country pay, and (3) to support foot security. It represents almost 14% of Gross domestic product, around 13% of commodities, and supports half of the country's populace as its chief kind of revenue (58% of the labor force). Indian agribusiness has seen wide varieties in development execution during a range of sixty years after autonomy. The fluctuation was especially articulated because of the means idea of cultivating in India also, the area's weighty reliance on storms and other climatic boundaries. In the starting a very long time after the initiation of arranged turn of events, it was the green insurgency innovations that started up development in the area for almost thirty years. The effect of green upheaval tightened step by step towards the later long stretches of the last century. Financial changes started in the mid-nineties essentially affected agrarian areas, basically because of the opening up of the economy to cutside contest, advancement of exchange, and liberation of information and other sub-areas. (to conquer troubles in distinguishing underlying breaks or mainstream speed increase and so on because of between year variances and to catch the impacts of significant changes in advancements and strategies on the area in different stages, an investigation dependent on decadal pattern development

India has completed its 75 years of independence this year and embarked a journey of development and growth with an everlasting urge of doing better and better by each passing day.

With a massive population, favourable demographics, and a strong catch-up potential due to low baseline GDP per head, India is the world's fastest growing big economy. According to World Bank figures, India overtook France as the world's sixth largest economy in 2017, with a GDP of USD 2.59 trillion. According to a forecast by global consulting firm PwC, India was set to overtake the United Kingdom as the world's largest economy by 2019.

According to the IMF's Globe Economic Outlook report, India's GDP would grow by 7.5 percent in the 2019-20 fiscal year, maintaining a positive trend as the rest of the world struggles. "India's economy is likely to pick up in 2019," according to the research, "benefiting from lower oil prices and a slower pace of monetary tightening than previously envisaged, as inflation pressures relax." According to the Central Statistics Office (CSO), Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MOSPI), GDP growth in 2018-19 is expected to be 7.2 percent, up from 6.7 percent in 2017-18.

No matter who we are or where we come from, we're all entitled to basic human rights that include clean water to drink, clean air to breathe, and healthy land to call home.




### **Documentary Screening of India: Drowning in Plastic**





### Webinar on Breast Cancer Awareness






