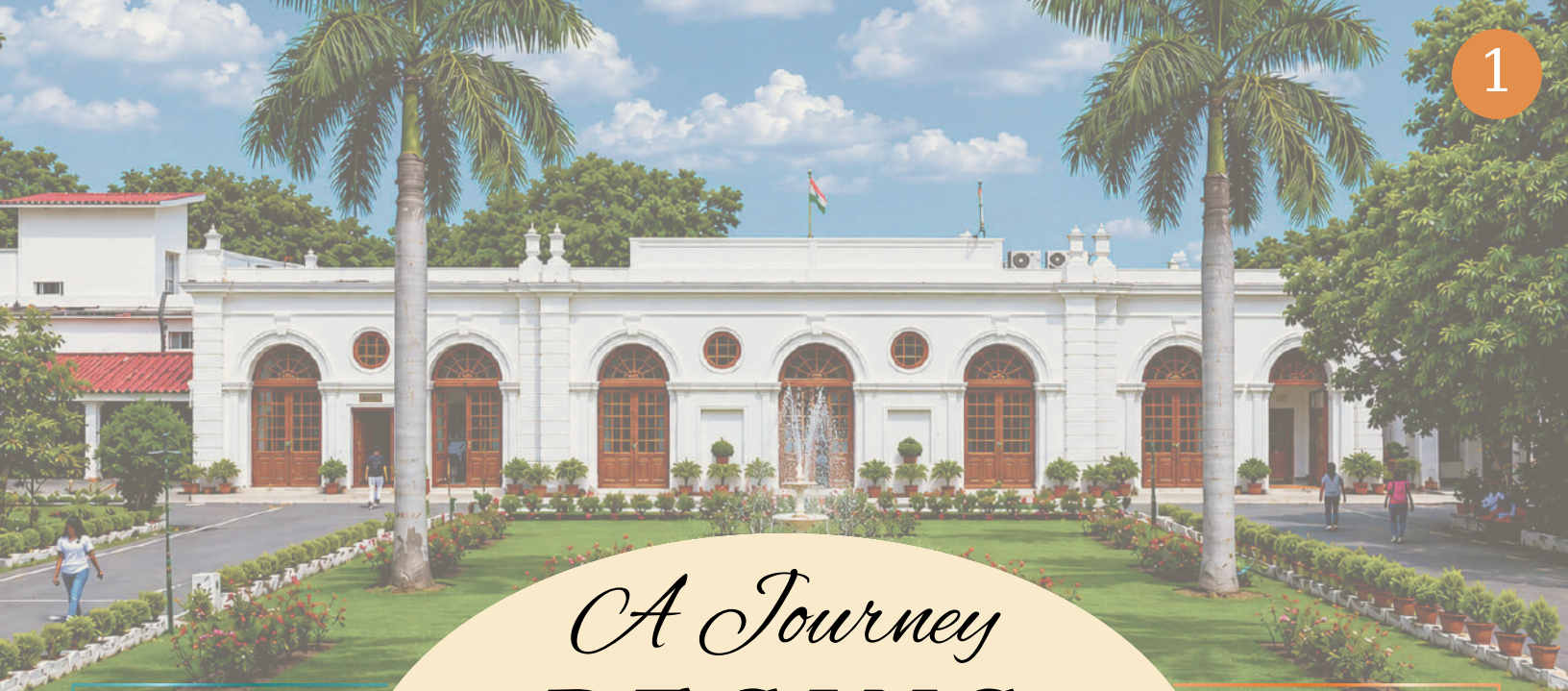

100 Years of Empowerment

As you embrace the environs of Indraprastha College for Women, University of Delhi, you are now a part of the rich canvas of a 100-year old Women's College and a 100-year old University. You are now a member of both the history and the future of the oldest women's college of the University. The façade and the fauna that you see around stand as nurturing witnesses to innumerable batches of diverse young women from all walks of life, who had the character and courage to not only give shape to their individual aspirations but also strengthen the rich fabric of our country.

The College

The story of Indraprastha College for Women (IPCW) is a chronicle of the graceful and gutsy women of Bharat. From 1904 to 2026, we have evolved and reached this much-awaited and pristine juncture of our Centenary celebrations. What we see today is a milestone in the remarkable journey that began on 20 May 1904, when the Indraprastha Putri Pathshala welcomed its first batch of girls in a rented building in Gali Anar in Kinari Bazar locality of Chandni Chowk in Old Delhi.

In the same year, amidst the sacred chanting of Vedic hymns and the pristine fires of the holy Aavus, the school was shifted to the haveli donated by the late Lala Japan Nath at Naiwars and renamed Indraprastha Hindu Kanya Shikshalaya. The Shikshalaya turned from a primary to a high school in 1917. Five years down the line, in 1922, the University of Delhi was established. And in May 1924, twenty years after the auspicious beginning of the Pathshala, we see the emergence of the Indraprastha Girls Intermediate College.

Where we stand today, in this building with its lawns, fountains, French windows and angular corridors, is the Alipore House. It was on the auspicious day of 9 August 1938, that Indraprastha College got Alipore house. Her Excellency Lady Linlithgow was invited to inaugurate the College campus on 7 February 1939. Subsequently, in September 1945, the College was given a name by which it is now known, Indraprastha College for Women.

The Community

We have a layered history before us. There is a history of the institute: its founders, its architecture and its ethos. And then there is a parallel history of the nation within which IPCW took shape. The Quit India Movement (1942-45) and its build-up was a fertile ground for students to build political opinion and support the cause of freedom. If one looks at old talent records, one finds not only Sucheta Kriplani (who took the Intermediate classes) but many others.

Some students who were in college during 1941 till 1944 participated in underground activities, met freedom fighters and were imprisoned both in the Delhi and Lahore Jail for hoisting the national flag after removing the Union Jack. The students boycotted foreign goods enthusiastically, set them on fire and chanted slogans. They were influenced by the Indian National Army and the fervour for independence was so high that in 1945, in the absence of local conveyance, a group of girls decided to walk from Civil Lines to Ramlila Maidan, where they were lucky enough to see and to listen to Sardar Patel and Aruna Asaf Ali, among a few others.

The Century

The educational landscape of Bharat has evolved. New times brought in newer dimensions and developments. In 2002, the College building was declared a heritage building by the Government of the National Capital Territory of India. In 2004, the foundation stone was laid for the second student residence of the college, called the Indraprastha Hostel.

The eve of International Women's Day on 8 March 2006 witnessed the inauguration of the College Museum and Archives. New classrooms for facilitating the teaching-learning activities of the college were inaugurated in 2016 as the New Academic Block and in 2019 as the New Extension Block.

IPCW has an enrollment of approximately 3500 students in its Undergraduate and Postgraduate programs. Following the mandate of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the College continues to offer a wide range of courses that promote interdisciplinary studies. The College has to its credit a unique, one-of-a-kind course in the University of Delhi, the self-financed B.A. (Honours) in Multi Media and Mass Communication.

The College is 100% barrier free and has an "Under One Roof" Enabling Unit (EU) and Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC). Apart from a proactive financial aid policy, it organises courses in ICT skills for Economically Weaker Sections (EWS), and skill training courses for Persons with Benchmark Disability (PwBD).

The College has two Student Residences to accommodate 450 students: the 170-seater Indraprastha College for Women's Student Residences and the Kalavati Gupta Student Residences (KG), which has a total number of 280 seats.

In addition to this sustained growth and prosperity of the institution, Indraprastha College for Women boasts of reviving and renewing its very own NCC Girls' Unit in 2024. The College has an active Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and submits its Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) regularly to the accreditation body. It is accredited with Grade A.

Indraprastha College for Women believes that learning extends far beyond the classroom, offering students a vibrant campus life enriched with academic, cultural, literary, and leadership experiences. Flagship events such as Samanvay: the annual award ceremony, and the Centenary Celebrations and Alumni Meet provide opportunities to celebrate excellence, creativity, and the College's rich legacy. A special highlight of the year was the 150th Anniversary of Vande Mataram, commemorated through a memorable programme that celebrated India's shared heritage, patriotism, and cultural values. Through interactions with distinguished dignitaries, eminent alumni, scholars, and artists, students gain meaningful exposure that inspires leadership, social responsibility, and personal growth. Together, these experiences nurture confident, compassionate, and future-ready women committed to making a positive impact on society.

Admission Guidelines



Admission to all courses for the academic session 2026-27 will be through the Common Seat Allocation System CSAS (UG) 2026/ CSAS (PG) 2026 based on the scores obtained in CUET(UG) 2026/CUET(PG) 2026, except for Foreign Nationals.



The name of the candidate must match the candidate's name as it appears on their corresponding School Board qualifying certificates and in the CUET (UG)-2026 / CUET (PG)-2026. Similarly, the parents' names must also match on the certificates.



No undertaking on behalf of incomplete/invalid/non-availability of the document/certificate at the time of admission will be accepted.



The College will follow the admission schedule announced by the University of Delhi. Kindly check the University website for updates.



Candidates should refer to the UG/PG Bulletin of Information 2026-27 and the admission website (admission.uod.ac.in) for all updates, schedules, and information related to admissions.

Undergraduate Admission Process 2026



Admission to all UG courses for the academic session 2026-2027 will be through the Common University Entrance Test (UG)-2026 CUET (UG)-2026 and Common Seat Allocation System (CSAS)-2026.

Candidates should refer to the UG Bulletin of Information 2026-27, CSAS-2026, and other rules published by the University of Delhi website <https://admission.uod.ac.in/>

CUET UG



Step 1: For admission to Undergraduate Programs at the University of Delhi, all candidates (including those applying under supernumerary quota) must register for CUET (UG)-2026 at <http://cuetug.ntaonline.in>

Step 2: CUET (UG)-2026 is conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA).

Step 3: For admission to the University of Delhi, the candidate must appear in CUET (UG)-2026 in those subjects in which she has passed Class XII.

CSAS Portal



Admission to all UG Programs is done on the basis of the eligibility requirements, criteria, and procedures specified by the University of Delhi.

Step 1: Only the candidate who has appeared in CUET (UG)-2026 and has passed Class XII from a single recognised board will be eligible to apply for the CSAS (UG)-2026.

Step 2: For seat allocations and admissions, candidates must apply to the Common Seat Allocation System CSAS (UG)-2026 of the University of Delhi at <https://ugadmission.uod.ac.in/>

Step 3: The Common Seat Allocation System (UG) 2026 includes:

Phase I- Applying to the University of Delhi

Phase II- Filling the Preference for Programs and Colleges

Phase III- Allocation-cum-Admission

(i) Annual Fee payable by Foreign Students for any Course. These charges are to be paid by the Foreign Students in addition to the Course & Other Fees
Rs. 26,354/-

(ii) Annual Fee payable at College by Foreign Students for B.Sc. (H) Computer Science and B.A. (H) Multi Media and Mass Communication (other than SAARC Countries Nationals)
Rs. 2,84,035/-

(iii) Tibetan students are exempted from paying the university registration fee and additional fee payable to the college as Foreign Students.

(iv) SC/ST students whose parents' income is such that they are not paying Income tax are exempt from the payment of the College Tuition fee amounting to Rs. 180. They are required to submit an affidavit/document in support of this claim at the time of admission.

(v) Refund of Security / Caution Money must be claimed before the end of the financial year (31st March) in which the student leaves the College, failing which the same shall be forfeited.

(vi) The College reserves the right to change the fee without any prior notice.

*** A student who does not fulfil the minimum attendance requirement per semester will be considered to have wasted the precious resources of the College and will forfeit all refundable deposits made to the College and will pay under that head in the successive semester at the time of admission to that semester.**

Admission through Extra-Curricular Activities and Sports



Step 1: Candidates desirous of taking admission under the supernumerary quota for ECA and/or Sports must appear in CUET (UG) - 2026.



Step 2: For admissions to ECA and Sports supernumerary seats, a weightage of 25% will be given to CUET score and 75% to certificates/trials/performances as per University of Delhi norms.



Step 3: The option to apply under Sports/ECA supernumerary quota is available only under Phase I of CSAS (UG)-2026. After submission of CSAS(UG)-2026 application fees, no option shall be made available to the candidate to apply under Sports/ECA supernumerary quota, if not registered under the same earlier.



Step 4: Candidates must select the Program(s) + College(s) Combination in which the ECA /Sports category is being offered as their preference(s).



Step 5: For both ECA and Sports quota, only the certificates issued between the time period of 1st May 2023 - 30th April 2026 will be considered.



Step 6: Allocation to ECA/Sports Supernumerary quotas will be as per University of Delhi norms.



Step 7: All candidates seeking admission through ECA/Sports Supernumerary quota will have to mandatorily submit an Undertaking at the time of admission, stating that for the entire period of their undergraduate study they shall participate in the activities for the College and the University whenever desired, failing which the University and/or the College has the right to cancel the admission at any time during the entire duration of the course of study. 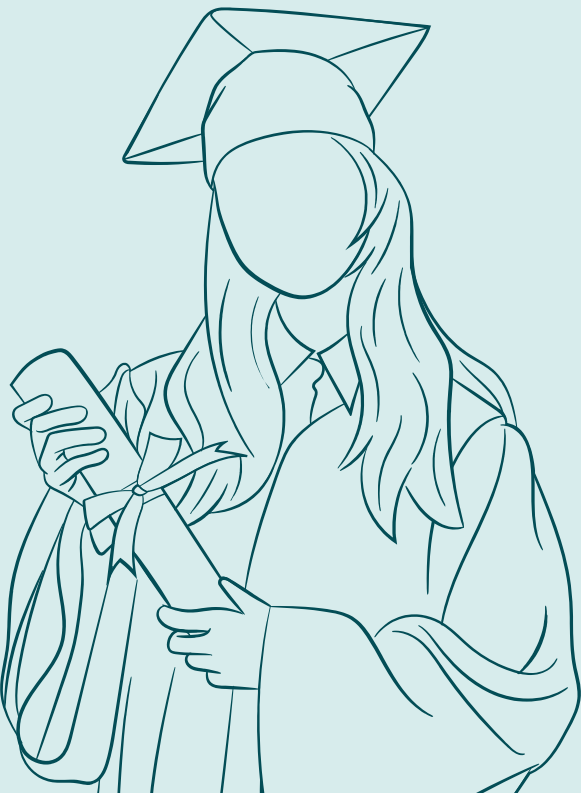

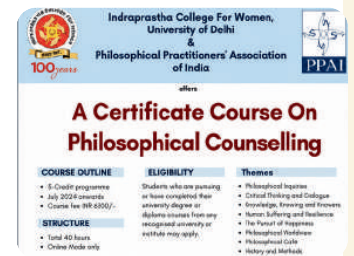

Internship and Placement Opportunities

The Career Counselling and Placement Committee (CCPC) of Indraprastha College for Women is best described by its name, J.E.E.T., which stands for Jobs | Entrepreneurship | Excellence | Talent. J.E.E.T., works towards facilitating fellow students to make informed decisions about their career choices. By bringing campus recruiters from various sectors, it offers graduating students a range of job opportunities, catering to the requirements of students from different subject streams. 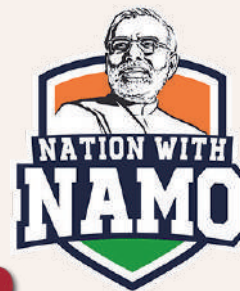

Rules and Regulations

Important Ordinances



- As per Ordinance VII (Attendance Rules) a candidate for the Semester I/III/V/VII Examination shall not be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions of attendance unless she has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than two thirds of the lectures/practical/presentations/tutorials required to be attended provided that a student of the Semester I/III/V/VII who does not fulfill the required conditions of attendance, as above, but has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent of lectures/practical/ presentations/tutorials during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the Principal of the College concerned, appear for the ensuing semester Examination; but such a candidate shall be required to make up the deficiency at lectures and practicals, in the next semester of the same academic year.
- Provided that a student of the II/IV/VI semester who does not fulfill the required conditions of attendance as above, but has attended in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent of the lecture/practical/presentation/ tutorials, held during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the Principal of the College concerned, be allowed to appear at the ensuing examination provided that s/he makes up the deficiency of the said attendance by combining the attendance of the previous semester in the ensuing semester.
- Provided further that the Principal of the College concerned may permit a student to appear in an examination notwithstanding that the student has not fulfilled the attendance requirement, if in the opinion of the Principal, such student shall make up the deficiency in the succeeding academic year.
- In the case of a student who
 1. is selected as a member of the N.C.C. to participate in the annual N.C.C. Camps or is deputed to undertake Civil Defence work and allied duties; or
 2. is enrolled in the National Service Scheme and is deputed to various public assignments by or with the approval of the Principal/Head of the Department concerned; or
 3. is selected to participate in sports as part of their CA; or

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4. represents the College in Inter college tournaments organized by Delhi University, or a student selected for coaching camp of the University of Delhi team (Camp organized by DUSC), or a student who represents Delhi state in National tournaments organized by National Sports Federations, or a student who represents the University in tournaments organized by Association of Indian Universities, or a student who represents India in International Tournaments organized by International Federations/Associations and FISU, (selection through AIU), or a student who represents India in Olympics/Commonwealth Games/Youth Games/World Championships/organized by International Olympic Committee, or in national or international fixtures in games and sports approved by the Competent Authority; or

5. is required to represent the University at the Inter-University Youth Festival; or

6. is required to participate in periodical training in the Territorial Army or a student who is deputed by the College to take part in Inter-College sports or fixtures, debates, seminars, symposia or social work projects or a student who is required to participate in curricular activities held in other Universities or such, to be approved by the Principal/Head for this purpose.

In calculating the total number of lectures etc. delivered in the College, or in the University, as the case may be, for his/her course of study in each academic year, the number of lectures etc., in each subject delivered, during the period of absence and as approved by the Principal/Head for the above purposes, shall deemed to have been attended by the student.

Students selected to represent the College in sports, cultural programmes, debates, or any other competitive events sponsored by the College shall obtain prior written permission from the Principal. Exemption from attendance on any other grounds may be granted only with the prior written approval of the Principal. Such approval must be sought and obtained well in advance and shall not be entertained at the time of examination.

Medical Leave- As per Ordinance VII of the University of Delhi, the Principal of the College may consider, on the basis of the Medical Certificates produced, exceptionally hard cases of students who had fallen seriously ill or had met with an accident during the year disabling them from attending classes for a certain period, with a view to determining whether the lectures etc. delivered during the said period, or a part thereof, could be excluded for purposes of calculation of attendance of the year and decide each case on its own merits.

The benefit of exclusion of lectures contemplated above shall in no case exceed 1/3rd of the total number of lectures/practicals/presentations/tutorials delivered.

Applications for leave of absence due to sickness or hospitalization must be supported by a medical leave and fitness certificate from a recognized medical practitioner. This documentation should be submitted to the Principal within a week of the student rejoining the College after the leave period.

As per University Ordinance VII, no person shall be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions in respect of his instructions, unless in addition to the requirements regarding attendance and other conditions, she has appeared and satisfied by her performance the Principal of the college in such tests, written and/or oral, as may be held by her in her discretion. The Principal of the College shall have, and shall be deemed always to have had, the power to detain a student in the same class in which she has been studying, or not to send her up for the University Examination, in case she did not appear at the tests aforesaid or her performance was not satisfactory. The Principal of a College/Head of the Institution shall have Power to strike off the name of a student who is grossly irregular in attendance in spite of warning, or when the absence of the student is for such a long period.

- **Student conduct:** Students are accountable to the Principal for their behaviour and must avoid any actions, inside or outside the college, that may breach discipline or disrupt the normal functioning of the college. Violations of discipline will result in disciplinary actions, which may include warnings, suspension from classes or examinations, suspension from the College Library, or even expulsion from the College, in accordance with Ordinance XV(B), XV(C) and Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act and Rule 2013, of the University of Delhi's Rules of Discipline.
- **Respectful Behaviour:** Students must conduct themselves respectfully towards staff members (both teaching and administrative) and fellow students. Insubordination, inappropriate language, or improper conduct, including teasing, will be strictly addressed.

- **Classroom Conduct:** Students must maintain complete silence during classes and avoid any disorderly behaviour. Students are expected to take proper care of the College furniture and premises. They must not spoil, damage, or tamper with College property, including furniture, fittings, and lawns. Furthermore, students with contagious or infectious diseases will not be permitted to attend the College.
- In compliance with the Hon'ble Supreme Court's order, smoking is strictly prohibited inside and around educational institutions. Delhi University, in collaboration with the Delhi Police and the World Lung Foundation South Asia, is promoting a tobacco-free environment. As part of this initiative, smoking is completely banned in the College.
- No society may be formed in the College, nor may any person be invited to address a meeting in the College, without the prior permission of the Principal.
- **Proctorial Committee:** The Proctorial Committee is dedicated to maintaining discipline within the college. It comprises faculty members and student representatives.
- **Discipline and Environment:** All students are required to maintain discipline and a congenial environment while studying at the college.
- **Anti-Ragging Measures:** Ragging is a serious offence. The Proctorial Committee implements preventive and prohibitive anti-ragging measures in accordance with Ordinance XV-C of the University of Delhi. At the time of admission and at the beginning of each academic session, every student must give an undertaking pledging non-participation in any form of ragging. Each student is provided with a booklet on the University of Delhi Anti-Ragging Ordinance, which must be strictly adhered to.
- **Prohibited Activities:** Students must not engage in activities that constitute indiscipline, such as:
 - ▶ Defacing buildings or structures and damaging institute property.
 - ▶ Using mobile phones in academic areas, including lecture rooms/halls, corridors, and the library.
 - ▶ Misusing college ID cards.
 - ▶ Any other act deemed by the competent authority to be an act of indiscipline.

College Discipline-Ordinance XV-B

Maintenance of Discipline among Students of University

1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice-Chancellor.
2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he/she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance, the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution/Department and against any student within the University of Delhi;
 - carrying of, use of, or threat to use of any weapons;
 - any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976;
 - violation of the status, dignity, and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes;
 - any practice, whether verbal or otherwise, derogatory to women;
 - any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner;
 - wilful destruction of institutional property;
 - creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds;
 - causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
 - ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
4. Without prejudice to the generality of his/her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor may, in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid, order or direct that any student or students-
 - be expelled; or
 - be, for a stated period, rusticated; or
 - be not for a stated period, admitted to a course or courses of study in a College, Department, or Institution of the University; or
 - be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
 - be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or
 - that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.
5. The Principals of the Colleges, Heads of the Halls, Deans of Faculties, Heads of Teaching Departments in the University, the Principal, School of Correspondence Courses and Continuing Education and Librarian shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in their respective Colleges, Institutions, Faculties and Teaching Departments in the University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to, such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions, or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties, and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself/herself with a copy of these rules.
7. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he/she submits himself/herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and the several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances, and the Rules that have been framed thereunder by the University.

Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging-Ordinance XV-C

1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited within the premises of the College/Department or Institution and any part of the Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students, and includes individual or collective acts or practices which-
 - involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
 - violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
 - violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes.
 - expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem.
 - entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, University Student Residences or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suo moto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under Clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3 (a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
10. The Vice-Chancellor may, in other cases of ragging, order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not admitted for a stated period to a course of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of the University of Delhi are found guilty under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diplomas conferred by the University.
12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging, whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging, will also amount to ragging.

Prohibition of and Punishment for Sexual Harassment-Ordinance XV-D

University Grants Commission (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal of Sexual Harassment of Women Employees and Students in Higher Educational Institutions) Regulations, 2015

Section 1 - Short title extent and commencement

1. These regulations may be called the University Grants Commission (Prevention, prohibition and redressal of sexual harassment of women employees and students in higher educational institutions) Regulations, 2015.
2. They shall apply to all higher educational institutions in India.
3. They shall come into force on the date of their publication in the Official Gazette.

Section 2 - Definitions

1. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires: -
 - a. "Aggrieved woman" means in relation to work place, a woman of any age whether employed or not, who alleges to have been subjected to any act of sexual harassment by the respondent;
 - b. 'Act' means the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (14 of 2013);
 - c. "campus" means the location or the land on which a Higher Educational Institution and its related institutional facilities like libraries, laboratories, lecture halls, residences, halls, toilets, student centers, hostels, dining halls, stadiums, parking areas, parks-like settings and other amenities like health centers, canteens, Bank counters, etc., are situated and also includes extended campus and covers within its scope places visited as a student of the HEI including transportation provided for the purpose of commuting to and from the institution, the locations outside the institution on field trips, internships, study tours, excursions, short- term placements, places used for camps , cultural festivals, sports meets and such other activities where a person is participating in the capacity of an employee or a student of the HEI;
 - d. "Commission" means the University Grants Commission established under section 4 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (3 of 1956);
 - e. "Covered individuals" are persons who have engaged in protected activity such as filing a sexual harassment charge, or who are closely associated with an individual who has engaged in protected activity and such person can be an employee or a fellow student or guardian of the offended person;
 - f. "employee" means a person as defined in the Act and also includes, for the purposes of these Regulations trainee, apprentice (or called by any other name), interns, volunteers, teacher assistants, research assistants, whether employed or not, including those involved in field studies, projects, short-visits and camps;
 - g. "Executive Authority" means the chief executive authority of the HEI, by whatever name called, in which the general administration of the HEI is vested. For public funded institutions the Executive Authority means the Disciplinary Authority as indicated in Central Civil Services (Classification, Control and Appeal) Rules, 1965 or its equivalent rules;

Prohibition of and Punishment for Sexual Harassment-Ordinance XV-D

h. “Higher Educational Institution” (HEI) means a university within the meaning of clause (j) of section 2, a college within the meaning of clause(b) of sub- section (1) of section 12A and an institution deemed to be a University under section 3 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (3 of 1956);

i. “Internal Complaints Committee” (ICC) means Internal Complaints Committee to be constituted by an HEI under sub regulation (1) of regulation 4 of these regulations. Any existing body already functioning with the same objective (like the Gender Sensitization Committee Against Sexual Harassment (GSCASH)) should be reconstituted as the ICC;

Provided that in the latter case the HEI shall ensure that the constitution of such a Body is as required for ICC under these regulations. Provided further that such a Body shall be bound by the provisions of these regulations;

j. “Protected activity” includes reasonable opposition to a practice believed to violate sexual harassment laws on behalf of oneself or others such as participation in sexual harassment proceedings, cooperating with an internal investigation or alleged sexual harassment practices or acting as a witness in an investigation by an outside agency or in litigation;

k. “Sexual harassment” means

i. “An unwanted conduct with sexual undertones if it occurs or which is persistent and which demeans, humiliates or creates a hostile and intimidating environment or is calculated to induce submission by actual or threatened adverse consequences and includes any one or more or all of the following unwelcome acts or behaviour (whether directly or by implication), namely; -

1. any unwelcome physical, verbal or non-verbal conduct of sexual nature;
2. demand or request for sexual favours;
3. making sexually coloured remarks
4. physical contact and advances; or
5. showing pornography”

ii. any one (or more than one or all) of the following circumstances, if it occurs or is present in relation or connected with any behaviour that has explicit or implicit sexual undertones i. implied or explicit promise of preferential treatment as quid pro quo for sexual favours; ii. implied or explicit threat of detrimental treatment in the conduct of work; iii. implied or explicit threat about the present or future status of the person concerned; iv. creating an intimidating offensive or hostile learning environment; v. humiliating treatment likely to affect the health, safety dignity or physical integrity of the person concerned;

l. “student” means a person duly admitted and pursuing a programme of study either through regular mode or distance mode, including short-term training programmes in a HEI;

Prohibition of and Punishment for Sexual Harassment-Ordinance XV-D

Provided that a student who is in the process of taking admission in HEIs campus, although not yet admitted, shall be treated, for the purposes of these regulations, as a student of that HEI, where any incident of sexual harassment takes place against such student; Provided that a student who is a participant in any of the activities in a HEI other than the HEI where such student is enrolled shall be treated, for the purposes of these regulations, as a student of that HEI where any incident of sexual harassment takes place against such student;

m. "Third Party Harassment" refers to a situation where sexual harassment occurs as a result of an act or omission by any third party or outsider, who is not an employee or a student of the HEI, but a visitor to the HEI in some other capacity or for some other purpose or reason;

n. "victimization" means any unfavourable treatment meted out to a person with an implicit or explicit intention to obtain sexual favour;

o. "workplace" means the campus of a HEI including 1. Any department, organisation, undertaking, establishment, enterprise, institution, office, branch or unit which is established, owned, controlled or wholly or substantially financed by funds provided directly or indirectly by the appropriate HEIs; 2. Any sports institute, stadium, sports complex or competition or games venue, whether residential or not used for training, sports or other activities relating thereof in HEIs; 3. Any place visited by the employee or student arising out of or during the course of employment or study including transportation provided by the Executive Authority for undertaking such journey for study in HEIs.'
